May 20, 2006 - The Philadelphia Barrage of Major League Lacrosse (MLL), the premier outdoor lacrosse league, won their 2006 season home opener against the Rochester Rattlers Saturday night at Franklin Field. The Bud Light MVP was Philadelphia's Ryan Boyle (A) who recorded two goals and six assists while leading the Barrage to a 12-11 win over Rochester.

Michael Springer (A) scored the first goal for Philadelphia, assisted by Boyle, early in the first quarter. Rochester's Andrew Combs (A) scored an unassisted goal to tie the game at 1-1. Springer scored his second and third goal of the game on assists by Boyle, bringing the Barrage to a 3-1 lead. A.J. Shannon (M) and Chris Schiller (M) scored for Rochester tying the game 3-3, but Matt Striebel (M) scored on an assist from Boyle, putting the Barrage ahead by one at the end of the first quarter.

Kevin Cassese (M) scored the only goal of the second quarter and the only two-point goal for Rochester of the game. Goalkeeper Mike Levin held the Barrage to no goals during the second quarter recording 10 saves. The scored at the end of the second half was 5-4, Rochester.

Rochester started off the second half with a goal by John Grant (A) giving them a two-goal lead. Philadelphia tied the game at 5-5 with goals by Boyle and Jed Prossner (A), his first of the night. With goals by Cassese and Seth Goldberg (A), Rochester went ahead again by two. Philadelphia went on a five goal run, three to round out the third quarter by Striebel, Springer and Prossner. The score at the end of the third was 9-8, Philadelphia.

Boyle and Jack deVilliers (M) scored to finish out the Barrage's five-goal run in the fourth quarter, putting them ahead by three. Rochester tied the game with goals scored by Pat Dutton (M), Goldberg and Joe Kostolansky (A/M). B.J. Prager (A) scored his first goal of the game, off an assist from Roy Colsey (3), at 1:27 to put the Barrage ahead for good. It is the first time Philadelphia has won its season-opener.

May 20, 2006 - The Long Island Lizards defeated the Baltimore Bayhawks, 17-11, in front of 3,436 fans at Mitchel Athletic Complex on Saturday evening. Tim Goettelmann was named Bud Light MVP, scoring three goals and three assists. The Lizards, who led 7-2 after the first quarter, never trailed, as they dominated the Defending Champions and claimed their first win of the season.

Keith Cromwell, who scored three goals in his Lizards debut, opened the scoring 42 seconds in with an unassisted goal. Mike Mollot answered back to tie the game for Baltimore, but Adam Borcz and Goettelmann each scored to give Long Island a 3-1 lead.

Borcz scored the games only two-point goal a few minutes later to put the Lizards up 5-2. Cromwell, Blake Miller and Chris Massey also scored, extending the run to five points and breaking the game open.

With a 10-4 halftime lead, Long Island went on another five goal run in the third quarter, to take a 15-6 lead, and later led 17-7, their biggest lead of the game. Baltimore scored four straight goals in the fourth quarter to wrap up the game.

May 20, 2006 - An MLL record 13,167 fans witnessed history Saturday night as the Denver Outlaws defeated the Chicago Machine 24-14 at INVESCO Field at Mile High in both teams' inaugural game.

The Outlaws unveiled a potent offensive attack as the team scored 11 first-quarter points, tying the second-best total of points in a quarter by one team in league history. The offensive output was more than enough for Outlaws goaltender Trevor Tierney, who was strong in the pipes showing why Denver acquired the All-Star netminder.

Denver's Mike Law and Josh Sims paced all players with six points each, including a pair of two-point goals by Sims. Doug Shanahan tallied three points to lead the Machine, who scored the game's first two points to open an early 2-0 lead. Jeff Sonke put the Outlaws on the scoreboard with the first marker in Outlaws history at 5:20 of the first quarter. After Shanahan's two-pointer opened a 4-1 Chicago advantage, the Outlaws unleashed nine unanswered goals to end the opening stanza with an 11-4 lead.

After the teams each posted three goals in the second quarter, Chicago's Chris Malone notched three consecutive points to open the second half. Denver steadied its ship, scoring five of the final seven goals in the third quarter, including a pair of goals each by Mike LaMonica and Law. The Outlaws finished strong as Sims capped the evening with three points, including his second two-point goal of the game.

The record MLL crowd bested the previous all-time MLL record attendance of 12,674 at the 2005 Wild West All-Star Showdown, also held at INVESCO Field at Mile High. The previous regular season MLL record attendance record was 9,684 for Long Island at Rochester on Aug. 23, 2001. .

May 22, 2006 - The crowd of 2,845 at Rutgers University's Yurcak Field waited long enough, and for the second season in a row Liam Banks made their patience pay off.

Banks took a pass from Walid Hajj with 8.2 seconds remaining in overtime and sent it past Boston goalie Chris Garrity to give New Jersey a dramatic, 13-12, win over the Cannons in the longest game in Major League Lacrosse history (69:52).

Banks' tally marks the second-straight season that he has won the season opener for New Jersey in overtime. He did it against Long Island in 2005 to win 15-14. He ended the game with a pair of goals and an assist.

Pride goaltender, Rob Scherr, the game's Bud Light Most Valuable Player, made 20 saves, including six in overtime, four of them from point-blank range that had him pumping his fist in the air and the New Jersey crowd stomping away at the Yurcak Field bleachers.

He was nearly matched blow-for-blow by the Cannons Garrity, who made 22 saves overall and five in overtime.

"This was one of the most unbelievable games I have ever been a part of," said Pride head coach Peter Jacobs, who is now 1-0 on his career. "To have us play like that after having a shaky fourth quarter was very heartening. But what can you say about Scherr. He was amazing out there. He bailed us out and he deserved MVP honors."

The Pride took a 12-7 lead on Boston after three quarters after snapping a 7-7 tie by running off five straight, including the first tally of the season for Jesse Hubbard, who ended the game with a goal and three assists. Also scoring in that run was Pride newcomer A.J. Haugen, who ended with a pair of goals in his Pride debut.

The Cannons came back strong in the fourth quarter, outscoring the Pride 5-0 en route to a wacky overtime that had everyone reeling when it was done. Fans still lined the field and players were signing autographs nearly 35 minutes after the game's end.

"I don't think we could have envisioned a more exciting start to our season and to our tenure at Rutgers," said Pride General Manager Trey Reeder. "This was an amazing game for the fans of New Jersey and is a heck of a way to start 2006."

May 26, 2006 - The only thing lost for Chris Garrity on this day was his equipment bag. The Cannons goaltender made 26 saves, earned game Bud Light MVP honors and led the Cannons to a 16-12 victory over Long Island, Boston's first of the season. Garrity backboned the team in superb fashion despite missing his equipment bag for the majority of the day due to an airline mishap.

The set-back sure didn't show as he made 11 first have saves, several of the spectacular variety and helped the Cannons to an impressive 10-2 halftime lead against a potent Lizards offense.

The game began as a bit of a rout, but the Lizards stormed back in the second half to make things interesting in Uniondale, NY. Boston led by eight at halftime but the Cannons were outscored 10-6 in the second half.

In all eight Cannons scored goals. Mike Battista and Pat Myers each scored two-point goals. Conor Gill recorded three assists. John Christmas scored his first hat trick of the season, one of which stemmed the rising Long Island tide and kept the Lizards at bay.

Midway through the fourth quarter Long Island was in the midst of a stretch in which they outscored the Cannons 9-2. The Cannons managed to slow the tempo and after working most of the shot clock Battista found Christmas in front. Christmas finished after three fakes and effective finished the Lizards.

The Cannons played a dominant first half, holding the Lizards to just two goals, one of which came with just 33 seconds remaining in the second quarter. After Long Island's Stephen Berger scored 51 seconds into the second quarter it was all Cannons.

The Cannons started hot, shutting out Long Island 5-0 in the first quarter. Battista scored the game's first two goals, notching a two-point and a one-point tally. Bill Glading scored his first goal of the season while Christmas rounded out the first quarter scoring with a goal with 51 seconds left in the quarter.

Long Island fired back into the game in the third quarter outscoring Boston 5-3. Blake Miller and Tim Goettelman each scored twice in the quarter for the Lizards. Drew Pfarr opened the quarter with two straight goals. Chris Mucciolo, playing in his first game as a Cannon, put home his first career goal with 23 seconds remaining in the quarter ending Long Island's 5-0 run.

July 29, 2006 - The New Jersey Pride knew full well that heading into Saturday's game at Boston University's Nickerson Field that a loss meant elimination from the 2006 Major League Lacrosse playoff chase.

But the big guns that the Pride had counted on from its midfield were locked and loaded.
